Health emergency forces cancellation of

American Legion national convention



The American Legion's 102nd National Convention, originally scheduled for Louisville, Ky., Aug. 28 – Sept. 3, 2020, is canceled due to public-health concerns, ongoing restrictions and uncertainties related to the global coronavirus-COVID-19 pandemic.

"The safety of our members and compliance with state and federal public-health restrictions and guidelines made this decision not only prudent but necessary," American Legion National Commander James W. "Bill" Oxford said. "The Commonwealth of Kentucky has taken emergency actions to prevent the spread of infections and to follow federal guidance that restrict public gatherings and urge social distancing. No one can say with any certainty when these measures will be lifted or in what manner."

The American Legion National Executive Committee approved a resolution Wednesday, April 8, by email to cancel the annual convention of wartime veterans and their families for the first time in history. The 2020 Sons of The American Legion National Convention is also canceled.

"Local American Legion services – such as Buddy Checks, blood drives, meal delivery and volunteer assistance – remain the top priority of the organization as we navigate these challenging waters," Oxford said. "Community efforts are now under way throughout the country and around the world, while many American Legion state and foreign departments are canceling or postponing their conventions and elections to protect public health in the midst of this pandemic. Normally, national convention delegates are appointed during department conventions. This year is anything but normal."

The 102nd National Convention is now scheduled for Aug. 27 – Sept. 2, 2021, in Phoenix. Terms of currently serving national officers, including National Commander Oxford, are extended until then, according to the resolution.

American Legion Baseball 2020 Regular Season Guidelines


This communication is follow-up to the recent announcement regarding cancellation of eight 2020 American Legion Regional Tournaments and the 2020 American Legion World Series. The Americanism Commission formally voted to approve those cancellations in the interest of health and safety of youth and The American Legion Family this summer; and subsequently, in consultation with the national commander, announced the cancellations. The following information is provided to help clarify the policies and procedures for the remainder of the 2020 American Legion Baseball season. Determination of a 2020 Regular Playing Season - In accordance with the Charter of The American Legion, National Constitution and By-laws, the National Organization does not possess the authority to administer departmentlevel programs or operations. Any determination regarding regular season play within an American Legion department will come from department leadership and/or department baseball committee. Departments choosing not to sanction a regular playing season in 2020 will communicate to their teams in as much that the season is canceled and use of The American Legion name, emblem and baseball logo no longer be authorized the remainder of the 2020 calendar year. Risk Management - Those team managers, coaches, and volunteer staff whose department has not canceled 2020 regular season play are still required to complete background screening and abuse awareness training prior to any meetings, events, practices or games that involve youth participants. Annual National Registration Fee - With cancelation of the 2020 American Legion World Series and eight regional tournaments the Americanism Commission has suspended assessing teams an annual national registration fee (\$50 for senior teams; \$25 for junior teams). Refunds for those teams having previously paid a national registration fee are automatically forthcoming – it is not necessary for a team to request that refund and those refunds will be received by teams no later than June 30th . Administrative Fee – The administrative fee (\$35) assessed during the online registration process is non-refundable and will continue to be assessed for all teams during the online process. This fee offsets administrative costs that include, but not limited to, credit card processing fees, annual update and maintenance of the online registration system, and printing and shipping costs of the annual American Legion Baseball Rule Book. Department Fees – Teams having already paid applicable department fees through the online registration process and whose department subsequently cancels their 2020 playing season must seek refund through their respective department baseball chairman. Teams whose department has not canceled 2020 regular season play will continue to be assessed any applicable department fees during the online registration process. Roster Deadline -The deadline of June 25th is suspended requiring teams to submit an 18-man roster in accordance with American Legion Baseball National Rule 6.E. due to cancellation of the 2020 national tournaments. Departments continuing with 2020 regular season play will determine and communicate their own roster deadline dates within their department. Insurance Purchase Process and Refunds – In accordance with American Legion Baseball National Rule 1.N. Teams must purchase both group liability and accident insurance from K&K Insurance by June 1st. Teams whose department has not canceled 2020 regular season play will continue to purchase mandatory insurance through the online registration process. For those teams who may fail to form, June 25th is the deadline for initiating a refund of insurance premiums. Any team seeking an insurance refund must contact their department baseball chairman, who will in turn contact K&K Insurance on their behalf to initiate that refund. K&K Insurance will not issue or sell American Legion Baseball insurance to teams whose departments are not sanctioning a 2020 regular playing season.

Nationally appointed American Legion commission and committee chairpersons will also remain in their positions until the Fall 2021 meeting of the National Executive Committee.

The convention cancellation and extension of national officer terms are within the authority of the National Executive Committee, according to The American Legion's constitution and bylaws.

Also Wednesday, the NEC selected Louisville as the site of the 2026 American Legion National Convention, the first available date.

"The decision to close our offices to the general public, is part of the VA's to limit exposure to the vulnerable populations like our older Veterans and those with underlying medical conditions, as identified by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention." said VA Secretary Robert Wilkie. "VA is expanding existing technologies to remain accessible to Veterans, service members and their families."


Many in-person services are already available via the phone or online through virtual options like VA Video Connect. VBA has and continues to adjust to ensure the safety and well-being of its clients and staff.

IT'S A FACT



As the District 2 Commander I have had the opportunity during the past few months to meet with members of the various post who are part of the district. And, as usual, you en-

counter people who bring interesting information to the table. During a trip to Amargosa Valley and after breakfast while setting at the table the question, "Did you know that there was a county in Nevada called Bullfrog County?" was asked. The answer was, "no way"; however, a quick search of the internet validated there was such a county; and, as a piece of Nevada history, I thought it might be of interest to some of the readers of our Department newsletter. If nothing else, it will get our minds off COVID-19.

Today, we periodically read in the news articles on Yucca Mountain and the efforts to utilize it as a repository for radioactive waste. Well, that was a major news subject in the mid-1980s. The Federal Government was pushing to make it happen back then and folks in Nevada, especially in Nye County, did not want it there.

During the Legislative session in 1989 State Assemblyman, Paul May, drafted a bill to carve out a piece of Nye County that included Yucca Mountain to create the County of Bullfrog. This county was 12 miles square and was completely within the borders of Nye County. He drafted it with the idea that if the Federal Government did go through with declaring Yucca Mountain as the site for radioactive waste, then they would have to pay exorbitant fees to the state for the use of the land.

Unique features of this new county included,

- The only county in the United States to not have its county seat within the county Located in Carson City.
- The only county in the United States with a population of zero. It had no roads, no buildings or businesses, no private property or government structure within its territory.
- Its Sheriff and county commissioners and staff were paid a dollar a year and were appointed by the Governor.
- The county was not assigned to any of the state's nine district courts and therefore had no district attorney whose office was within the borders of Bullfrog County. With no legal system or citizens for a jury,
 a felony committed in Bullfrog County could not be prosecuted making it a location for committing the
 "perfect Crime".
- The county was the second shortest lived county within the United States being abolished in 2 years Beckham County, Kentucky holds the record.

During the two years of Bullfrog County's existence, the government of Nye county sued the state claiming the Law generating the county was unconstitutional. During October 1987, Nevada Attorney General stated that the state would not defend the Law in court. In February 1988, during a special hearing, Retired Nevada Supreme Court Justice David Zenoff found the law creating Bullfrog County to be unconstitutional. During the <u>Legislative session in 1989</u> Bullfrog County was abolished and the land retroceded back to Nye County.

In conclusion for this article, please be sure as you travel the state and visit with Legion Posts or other entities, push for stories from the local citizenry. You will be surprised with what you learn.

Members: Below is an E-mail that I sent out to all American Legion Baseball Coaches in Nevada with my concerns about our 2020 season.

I know some of you are concerned about American Legion Baseball so here it is, Legion baseball for Nevada, as I am the chairman, is governed by the Executive Board, The Commander and Adjutant of the Department. In order for me to change seasons around or summer schedule to fall I have to get prior permission from this body. We are also governed by our National organization.

Some of you don't like rules or regulations but that is what made and makes Legion baseball better than any other organization.

If we play this year in May or whenever you still have to register and pay your insurance. Insurance is good for one year from the date of purchase.

To date, only 4 teams have registered and only one has paid the insurance. The deadlines for registration and insurance is June 1, 2020. I cannot change these dates as for an extension so if we were to have a fall league, and I say if, all this has to be accomplished.

Your forms ones, Roster, will have to be done by June 23.

There is a team out there that still owes money from last year so you can see where I am coming from.

Veterans share 6 top insights for financial preparedness


1,507 U.S. military veterans recently offered their best advice for active-duty servicemembers and veteran families regarding personal financial decisions. The survey was conducted for the newly released <u>Veterans Financial Preparedness Report 2019</u>, prepared by the Legionnaire Insurance Trust for the departments of The American Legion in celebration of the Legion's 100th anniversary.

A mantra of saving

The overwhelmingly most common advice veterans shared was, "Save, save, save!" The importance of saving to financial health and preparedness can't be underscored enough, but what does this mean in the context of veterans' daily lives? Many veterans gave insights in their top advice.

Start saving from Day One, paying yourself first.

Veterans who start saving early are more likely to be in a strong financial position, according to the *Veterans Financial Preparedness Report 2019.* In fact, the report found that 60% of veterans who say they are ahead in their financial plans for retirement started saving immediately after high school or within the first 2 years of joining the military.



In their advice, these veterans comment that it's not always easy to save, but it is well worth it in the long run:

"Start when it's still uncomfortable-you won't regret it later."

"If you wait, chances are you'll wait too long."

- "Even \$10 [could] be worth hundreds by the time you retire because of compounding."
- "You will always feel you are not making enough. Do not let that keep you from saving."

"Pay yourself first."

"Focus on saving as much as possible with each check-almost like it's a car payment or a requirement."

Save as much as possible.

The more you can save, especially early on, the better financially prepared you will be. That can mean making sacrifices to ensure you're saving enough.

- "Beginning today, start putting money aside for your retirement years, and have it reviewed at least once per year. As your monthly paycheck goes up, so should your contributions to your own retirement."
- "Save until it hurts. Be soldier-minded in regards to how you save—be minimalists like a soldier. Then afterward, you've achieved a seemingly impossible number."
- "Start your Thrift Saving Plan (TSP) immediately, and put the maximum amount you can in."
- "If you have a 401k, match what the company vests."

Don't spend money on things you don't need.

Veterans emphasize the importance of discipline in spending. Prioritizing your true needs and savings over things you would like to have is a key part of that.

"Evaluate need versus want when buying expensive items."

- "Save every penny you can. Material things are not important. Expensive cars, clothes and other things are not important. Saving for your future is important!"
- "Don't get into debt. There's a big difference between want and need. The mistakes you make financially will follow you for decades."

Live within your means, avoiding debt.

In addition to having enough money for retirement, veterans' top financial concerns included more immediate financial needs, such as meeting financial obligations each month and paying off debt, according to the Legionnaire Insurance Trust report.

Veterans offered a number of recommendations for tackling these concerns, including:

- "Follow the rule that unless it's an emergency, if you can't pay cash, then you can't buy it."
- "Set a budget and communicate with your spouse. Talk about money-don't ignore it."
- "If you don't have a way to pay for something, don't buy it (discipline)."
- "No matter how much money you make, still make it a point to make that amount stretch as much as you can paycheck to paycheck."

Start planning for retirement early.

Looking ahead and working from a concrete financial plan unique to your circumstances and goals is another key piece of advice from veterans.

"Don't wait to start planning for the future. The earlier you start saving and thinking ahead, the better prepared you'll be."

- "Write down your financial goals: short-term, medium-term and long-term."
- "Stick to your plans and goals."

"Talk to other members and advisors about retirement early."

Educate yourself.

A key component to successfully planning and saving that many veterans highlighted is making sure to build your knowledge of personal financial issues. The report found a strong tie between financial preparedness and knowledge: 91% of veterans who are ahead of schedule for retirement consider themselves knowledgeable about personal finances, while 75% of veterans who are behind say they are *not* knowledgeable.

- "Use any and every opportunity and resource you can access or utilize."
- "Do your homework, and research every decision you make so you know exactly what you're getting into."
- "Listen to and learn from every military pension presentation. So much value is given that I learned from them and continue to use what I learned."
- "Take advantage of classes that will prepare you financially for your time in the service and for when you are discharged. Learn about organizations that can help current and former military persons."

The <u>Veterans Financial Preparedness Report 2019</u> additional advice from the 1,507 veteran respondents as well as insights from a Certified Financial PlannerTM with 16 years of military service, including three deployments. 
