Hello Everyone

Well as this newsletter is published, I hope everyone is doing well. We are going to leap into the latter 2000's in The American Legion. I do hope you're finding our history interesting as I have.



- October 2012 VA guarantees its 20 millionth home loan. 1936-1937 National Commander Harry Colmery and 1943-1944
 National Commander Warren Atherton escorted the original GI Bill of Rights through Congress in 1944, arguing passionately for veterans educational benefits, government-assured health care and what the called "readjustments allowances."

 Today Colliery and Atherton are lauded as the "fathers of the GI Bill" and its successors.
- August 2013 National Commander James E. Klutz announced that the American Legion family raised more than \$1.1 million for Operation Comfort Warriors during the 2012-2013 fundraising year. It easily surpassed his original goal of \$500,000.
- 2014 In the midst of a VA waiting-list scandal that reached up to the deaths of veterans waiting for care, The American Legion calls for the resignations of several top officials, including VA Secretary Eric Shinseki. The scandal would ultimately engulf multiple facilities and offices; the Legion kept the issue in front of the public and Congress via articles and testimony.
- August 2014 National Commander Michael D. Helm announces that Legion Family members and friends donated more than \$4 million (his goal) to Legion charities and programs during his year in office.
- July 2016 The Legacy Scholarship is expanded to children of post-9/11 veterans who have a combined VA disability rating of 50 percent or greater.
- June 2017 Created to hold VA employees more accountable, the Department of Veterans Affairs Accountability and Whistleblower Protection Act of 2017 is passed by Congress in concert with The American Legion. A longtime goal of the Legion, this legislation gives the VA Secretary the authority to terminate the employment of VA employees who do not hold the standard of the VA's missions, to help veterans. The American Legion worked hard with Congress, VA and others to create and pass this much needed veteran-centric legislation.
- August 16, 2017 The Harry W. Colmery Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2017 also known as the "Forever GI Bill" because it removes time limits for veterans who wish to use it for college is signed into law by President Donald J. Trump. The legislation is named for The American Legion past national commander who in the winter of 1943-44 drafted the Serviceman's Readjustment Act that changed the nation after World War II.

April is... Children and Youth Month

Spring is in the air. The days are getting longer, and organized events and activities begin to fill people's calendar. April is Children & Youth Month at The American Legion. Celebrated since 1938, April is the perfect time of year for posts, units, squadrons, departments and detachments to focus on the children and youth in their communities.

American Legion posts are encouraged to participate in "April Is Children & Youth Month" and create meaningful children and youth-themed community events and activities throughout the month, or the year. For example, since Easter is later than previous years – April 17 – it provides an opportunity for Legion Family members to host an Easter egg hunt, dye eggs, or conduct similar community outdoor events that celebrate spring. You also can host an arts and craft day, community picnic with relay races and face painting, an e-sport (electronic video game) tournament or help plant a community garden. And take advantage of the nature in your area by organizing a hike, fishing trip, or even a campout.

Other ways to celebrate April Is Children & Youth Month is to:

- Organize a meeting at the post that engages Legion Family members with local families to discuss issues that may be affecting youth in the community and provide ideas to resolve the issues. Then take those ideas to your community leaders.
- Host a community festival or information fair and ask local children and youth-oriented businesses and organizations to participate. Offer positive, family-friendly activities, entertainment and resources from the local businesses and organizations that can provide information to families about the services they offer.
- Host a youth summer activity open house. April is when many parents start looking into summer camps, organized sports and other summer activities. So have an open house where these types of organizations in the community can come to talk about the programs they offer.
- Invite a subject-matter expert on child safety, health and education to present at a post meeting.
- Reach out to your local schools to volunteer. Your team of Legionnaires may help teach flag etiquette in a classroom or help with a school landscaping project.
- Organize a community dinner at the Legion post as an opportunity to raise funds for Children & Youth programs. These donations can go toward The American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation, which supports our Temporary Financial Assistance program that provides immediate assistance to eligible military and Legion members with children in the home who are facing a hardship. Or help support the American Legion

Child Welfare Foundation, which provides grants to nonprofits that contribute to the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual welfare of the children and youth of this country.

Remember to invite local leaders and officials to support your event and engage the media in publicity and promotion. Communities need to see how The American Legion is impacting the community with services that are available and to hear why young people matter so much to Legionnaires. Allowing children and families an opportunity to come together with other families, organizations, local leaders and people who can help them thrive is an important contribution to our communities.

Every American Legion post can be that beacon of light for their community. Legion posts are not just for the veteran, but for the whole family and community. It is a place where our members can teach youth how to be an American citizen all the while engaging in family-friendly activities. It's where families go to feel a sense of community and give back to those that gave us our freedom. Every post is made up of people that comes from different backgrounds and ideologies, but one thing remains the same – youth are our future, let us teach them well.

Don't forget to capture your post, unit and squadron's activities and events on the Consolidated Post Report or Children and Youth Report. Show the department, detachment and national organization how your post has been able to have an impact on the youth in your community.

Coping when current events bring up past trauma

When armed conflict arises — no matter where in the world it happens — Veterans can experience a range of <u>challenging emotions</u> as events unfold. This can be especially true for combat Veterans who may be reminded of their own deployment experiences.

Common reactions to disturbing events

Feeling distress is a normal response to negative events, especially those that feel personal. Veterans may experience the following reactions in response to current events in Ukraine:

- Feeling frustrated, sad, helpless, distressed (including moral distress), angry or betrayed.
- Worrying about civilians, such as interpreters, who worked with the U.S. military in the region.
- A spike in symptoms of PTSD, anxiety, depression or other mental health conditions.
- Sleeping poorly.
- Drinking more or using more drugs.
- Trying to avoid reminders of disturbing events, including media coverage and social situations.
- Having more memories of military experiences and homecoming.
- Questioning the meaning and sacrifices of serving in the military.

Veterans also may feel that they need to expect and/or prepare for the worst. They may:

- Become overly protective, vigilant and guarded.
- Become preoccupied with a sense of danger.
- Feel a need to avoid being shocked by, or unprepared for, what may happen in the future.


It can be helpful to let yourself experience those feelings rather than trying to avoid them. Often these emotions will run their course naturally. However, if they continue without easing up or if you feel overwhelmed by them, the suggestions below can be helpful.

Strategies for managing ongoing distress

When current events bring up traumatic memories, it can be helpful to focus on the present and engage in the activities that are most meaningful and valuable to you. Is there something you can do today – as a family member, parent or community member – that is important to you?

Can you put more energy into something meaningful in your work or your spirituality? These activities will not change the past or the things you can't control, but they can help life feel meaningful and reduce distress, despite the things you cannot change. It can also help to ask yourself if your thoughts are helpful to you right now. Are there ways you can change your thinking to be more accurate and less distressing? For example, are you experiencing extreme thinking that views the situation as all bad or all good?

If so, try and think in less extreme terms. Rather than thinking, "My military service was useless," consider instead "I helped keep the world safe." (continued on next page)



Consider more general coping strategies:

- Engage in positive, healthy activities that are rewarding, meaningful or enjoyable, even if you don't feel like it, as they can lift your spirits.
- Stay connected by spending time with people who give you a sense of security, calm or happiness, or those who best understand what you are going through.
- Practice good self-care by engaging in soothing activities, such as listening to music, exercising, practicing breathing routines, spending time in nature or with animals, journaling or reading inspirational materials.
- Stick to your routines and follow a schedule for when you sleep, eat, work, and do other day-to-day activities.
- Limit your media exposure, especially if it's increasing your distress.
- Use a VA mobile app by visiting https://mobile.va.gov/appstore/mental-health.
- Try PTSD Coach Online, a series of online videos that will guide you through 17 tools to help you manage stress.

When to consider professional help

If your distress is prolonged or you are unable to function well, consider seeking support. At VA, Veterans can connect with compassionate professionals who have the education and experience to help manage depression, anxiety, PTSD, moral injury, complicated grief and other conditions that may be aggravated by current events.

- Every VA facility has mental health specialists. Visit https://www.mentalhealth.va.gov/get-help/local-care.asp to find a provider near you.
- Talk about your reactions in community-based VA Vet Centers, where over 70% of staff are Veterans themselves. Call 1-800-WAR-VETS or find a Vet Center <u>near you</u>.
- Go to <u>maketheconnection.net</u>, an online resource designed to connect Veterans, their family members and friends, and other supporters with information, resources and solutions to issues affecting their lives including challenging life events or experiences and mental health issues.
- If you feel as if you might hurt yourself or someone else, reach out now. Through the Veterans Crisis Line, confidential support is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. Call 1-800-273-8255 and Press 1, text to 838255 or chat online at veteranscrisisline.net/get-help-now/chat.

The membership statistics over the last month have been encouraging for the Nevada membership to meet our Department 2022 goal. Despite all the obstacles, the month to month comparison between March 8th and April 5th shows we increased the Department numbers by 273. Of that number, 218 were membership renewals.

We now have 4 Posts over 95% of Goal (Post 10, 16, 27, and 32.) 3 of which are at or over 100%. 2 more are close to the 95% of goal as of today. April 13th was the goal for all Posts and Districts to be at 95% or better. Post 10 in Las Vegas is still leading with 22 members over the Post goal. Congratulations are due to every Post that is making progress on a month to month basis.

National is requesting that each Post average 8 new members each month for the next 3 months. It is recognized that some rural small Posts will have difficulty reaching that goal. The larger Posts are asked to pick up the shortfall where possible.

We still have many previous Legion members that have dropped out for one reason or another. These are the ones that have not renewed since 2020. Maybe, these passed members may be willing to come back if they are currently able to do so. Personal contact is the best way to find out their current status.

If you are holding any renewals because you only have one to process, process every renewal or new member as you get them.

I want to thank all the Department Posts and Districts for meeting with me in person over these last few months. I am confident that all of our Posts are working hard to reach our Department 2022 Goal. Keep up the effort. Don't give up.



I am keeping the March newsletter article short and focused on two items, Flying Flags for Heroes and Membership.

The Flying Flags for Heroes program is struggling nationally, and we need to help. The original plan was to place 1 million flags during Commander Fox's term, this amounted to about 3 flags per member nationwide and seemed to be a reasonable goal. We (nationally) are less than 1/3 of the way there. On the conference call 2 months ago, participation was awful, with about 15 Detachments calling in, Nevada was one of the 15. Rather than give up, those that were on the call agreed to put the pedal to the floor and work as hard as possible to make up for those that didn't attend. This means that instead of 3 per member, we need 6 (or more). My suggestion is that we set a goal of 30 per Nevada SAL member to honor our deceased veterans and knock this program out of the park.

To that end, NVC Stewart has partnered with the Nevada Department of Veteran's Services (NDVS) to place 5,900 flags at the Northern Nevada Veterans Memorial Cemetery (NNVMC) the day before Memorial Day. I am asking the leadership in the Las Vegas area to do the same at the Southern Nevada Veterans Memorial Cemetery (SNVMC). The flags for the event at the NNVMC are being provided by the NDVS and I am certain they will do the same for the SNVMC. Don't let flags be an issue, we will find more if there is a need.

Can I get a commitment to try to plan a similar event SNVMC? My plans were to attend the NNVMC event but that could change if we need Detachment representation at the SNVMC. As an incentive, National Commander Fox is planning to send Preston Sharp (founder of FFFH and the SAL Spokesman for FFFH) to one event in the nation, if we have two large scale events we might be in the running for his visit.

This is an opportunity for Nevada to shine, I want to see the Detachment of Nevada as a standout in the nation.

Membership seems to be at a standstill in the mid 70%'s. What do we need to do to get more members renewed? Renewals should be the focus all year long until you get 100%. The Squadrons in yellow below need to get their membership numbers up before the convention. Please let me know if there are submission problems

Greetings Legionnaires, this has been a busy month. I have been calling the Posts and chatting with them about the Homeless Programs and Suicide Prevention Programs they may have.

Post 1 Commander, Trousdale:

- They don't have any programs per say
- They conduct buddy checks
- They have BBQ's that are open to the community
- There are VSO's that they direct to different organizations
- There is a church off El Rancho where the homeless can get food.
- There is a Gospel Mission that gives out food.
- There is a food bank of Northern Nevada
- There are homeless shelters in Reno.
- They have had standowns in the past but not since the pandemic

There is a member that had blankets made and handed them out to the homeless

Post 8 talked with Glynis Seely, and Auxiliary member.

- The Auxiliary does hand out food, has sock drives, and standowns
- The Post has a food bank that is open on Wednesdays
- They conduct buddy checks
- They do not have a VSO
- They refer Veterans to Share Village for homeless Veterans and they help with paperwork, help with job searches, and give and referrals to the VA. Share Village has three buildings and a fourth one is being built.
- The Post donated 30 cases of toiletries

Suicide prevention; there is one Post member that takes veterans out hunting and fishing

Post 22 talked with Commander Mike.

- The Post doesn't have anything set up right now
- They conduct Buddy Checks and keep track of members who are not doing well
- The VFW Post has a food bank that the Post donates to
- There is one group that provides meals for the holidays
- There is an Angel Tree for the community to pick names from
- The VFW has a VSO that the Post uses. There is a Post member who works at the VA clinic that is thinking of becoming a VSO for the Post
- There is one Post member that has a mobile shower that he pulls on his trailer for the homeless to use If there are homeless in the community that need help, the Post will help them

Nex month I will continue to share what the Posts in Nevada are doing for the homeless and for suicide prevention.
