The Department of Nevada would like to Welcome our new AL Adjutant Randy Connors.

Randy Connors is the new Adjutant for the Department of Nevada. He was born in Deer Lodge, Montana and raised in Great Falls. He attended public school grades K -12. While in high school, Randy attended the 1975 session of Montana Boys State and he played American Legion Baseball for the Great Falls Electrics. Randy graduated from Montana State University and then applied to Air Force Officer Training School. After completing OTS, he graduated from Undergraduate Navigator Training, Electronic Warfare Training, B-52D Combat Crew Training and then served as an Electronic Warfare Officer (EWO) on B-52D and B52G aircraft. His initial assignment was at Andersen AFB, Guam. He was then assigned to Grand Forks AFB, North Dakota. During this assignment he become an Instructor EWO, then was selected to serve as a Standardization Evaluator EWO. Randy then served as a flightline and academic instructor at Castle AFB, CA. At Castle AFB, Randy obtained a master's degree in human resource management. While at Castle AFB, Randy volunteered to crew missions for Operation Desert Shield and later flew seven combat missions during Operation Desert Storm. Upon return, Randy then assigned to the flight scheduler's office to schedule B-52 training missions. He separated as a captain in 1992 and was later promoted to major in the Individual Ready Reserve.

After serving in the Air Force, Randy initially worked in management and human resources positions for Mervyns Department Stores, Circus Circus Enterprises, and The Home Depot. In 2004, Randy found employment as a Geospatial Information Systems professional with Michael Baker International, (MBI) a world-wide engineering firm. At MBI, Randy first served as a Human Resources Specialist, then trained and worked as a GIS Analyst, and then later became a Certificated FAA Part 107 UAV operator. Randy retired after 21 years with MBI.

Randy became a member of Duby Reid American Legion Post 30, Sparks, Nevada in 2012 after being introduced to the post by his WWII veteran father-in-law Valdo Renucci. Since then, he has served Post 30 as the adjutant, building manager, finance officer, and commander. He has also held positions as District Vice Commander and Adjutant. He has actively worked with the JROTC students of Sparks High School on many community service projects at Post 30 including clean up details and colors presentations at post dinners. He was the post representative for JROTC Awards ceremonies and participated in Nevada Boys State as co-chair. He coordinated three Eagle Scout projects. Recently, Randy managed a project to install pavers in the front entryway of the building. For many years, Randy has worked with The Home Depot to obtain a grant to help the post with badly needed renovations and repair work. Finally, Post 30 secured a grant from The Home Depot Foundation for \$20,000. The money will go to replace the current vinyl tile flooring, kitchen appliances, toilets and possibly interior lighting. Currently, Randy continues to assist with various Post 30 building management duties, local JROTC programs, and Nevada Boys State. Randy is very enthusiastic about becoming Adjutant for the Department of Nevada and hoping to match the accomplishments and standards set by the previous Adjutant Lionel Motta.

These grants have aided organ-donor campaigns, supported efforts to help military children cope with deployment or loss of a parent, and funded projects that increased public awareness of Huntington's Disease, autism, Reyes Syndrome, meningitis, spina bifida, diabetes, cancer and other conditions.

The Commission on Children & Youth has focused recent attention on several important national programs, including the Children's Miracle Network, Ronald McDonald House Charities, Special Olympics, youth suicide prevention, Halloween safety, Family Support Network and Temporary Financial Assistance for families of the deployed, and Operation: Military Kids, among others.

The American Legion has been a staunch supporter for the children and youth of our nation since its founding in 1919. The commitment continues today for the National Commission on Children & Youth, as it seeks to improve the wellbeing of all children. The key to the future of a free and prosperous country, knows every generation of veterans, is held by the children and youth of today. The Legion strongly supports traditional family values, assistance for at-risk children and activities that promote their healthy and wholesome development. While there is no way of knowing what issues will face our youth tomorrow, our survival may well depend on the quality of care, education and training that we, as parents and citizens, provide for young people today.

The American Legion's Children & Youth pillar includes positions on: **Child Pornography.** The Legion opposes any attempts to weaken U.S. laws governing production, sale and distribution of pornographic materials.

Catastrophic Illness. The American Legion supports enacting legislation to financially assist families facing catastrophic illness of a child.

Intellectual Disabilities. The American Legion supports continuing research, and early intervention efforts, to prevent intellectual disabilities, to include research on the development and function of the nervous system, fetal treatments and gene therapy to correct abnormalities produced by defective genes, and early intervention programs with high-risk infants and children.

Immunization for Needy Children. The Legion urges federal funding for state and local health agencies to ensure that indigent children are afforded the opportunity to receive needed vaccines and treatments.

Family Integrity. The Legion promotes the family as the cornerstone of society and supports National Family Week in November. The Legion further recognizes that the natural family is the fundamental unit, inscribed in human nature and centered on the voluntary union of a man and woman in a lifelong covenant of marriage.

Media Violence. The American Legion supports appropriate state and federal legislation to restrict the excessive use of violence, vulgarity and immoral expressions in movies, television programs, news, video games and the Internet.

Drug Abuse. The American Legion fully supports adequate funding for all border, state, federal and military drug-trafficking prevention programs to keep illegal substances from reaching our nation's young people.

Child Sexual Exploitation. The American Legion supports appropriate legislation aimed at the prevention, investigation and prosecution of child sexual exploitation and seeks to empower the public to take immediate and direct action to enforce a zero-tolerance policy on the problem.

Encouraged every Post to promote complete transparency, this is to include having an agenda out to every Post member prior to the meeting, forwarding on all emails from Department and District to every Post member (we as leadership can never assume [everyone knows that means] what is important to a Post member). Having a calendar of Post events to District and then the District will create a Master calendar of all activities of every Post to allow every member within the District the knowledge of what is going on in our area of Nevada. During the Good of the American Legion (Adjutant Horton) brought up the intent to have monthly or more training through Zoom on a number of different topics to further the ability to preform the duties of the offices and performance within the Post to the highest degree.

It was a very good meeting with socializing after. It was encouraging to witness the sharing of information.

For the month of September, the Posts have been busy getting ready for the year with membership drives, with Post 32 already achieving a 100% to the membership goal. We had a Special meeting to discuss several different topics with them all being centered around complete transparency. Budgets (this being your road map on how you plan on utilizing Post funds) and Audits (to meet legal and regulatory requirements while identifying potential financial risks) and the importance of them (complete and total transparency). Another important topic was Mentorship and how those that are elected to different positions should always have someone/s that they can call for advice. Also, those that have been in leadership roles should always reach out and offer what they have learned so the same mistakes are not made over and over again. Membership was discussed in that we should be ready to discuss the American Legion at all times and that by adding another member even if it is not for your Post makes everyone stronger. Zoom meetings were discussed with a plan to have a monthly Zoom Training, Post Commanders Zoom Round Table Meetings, 1st Vice Membership Zoom Meetings... you get the idea. This is all being done to help each Post and the District feel more connected even with the total area the District covers being is 39,807 square miles




We are actively applying for grants and seeking donations, but we cannot do this alone. Time is short—we must secure funds quickly to honor our quotes and complete the project before winter sets in.

VA Southern Nevada Healthcare System receives top scores in latest CMS hospital ratings

NORTH LAS VEGAS, Nev. — VA Southern Nevada Healthcare System announced today it has earned a five-star rating as part of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services 2025 hospital quality ratings

CMS's hospital ratings are based on five categories: mortality, safety of care, readmission, patient experience and timely and effective care. A higher star rating, out of 5, indicates better performance on these quality measures

Within the last year, VA Southern Nevada Healthcare System has instituted a comprehensive quality improvement strategy to better serve Veterans. It includes several improvements focused on patient experience, clinical outcomes, and operational efficiency. Additionally, the facility also continues to expand timely access to care for Southern Nevada's growing Veteran population.

"These ratings highlight the excellent care VA Southern Nevada Healthcare System provides," said Executive Director Michael Kiefer. "Our job is to continue raising the bar for customer service and convenience throughout the department, so VA Southern Nevada Healthcare System works better for the Veterans, families, caregivers and survivors we are charged with serving."

As part of CMS's 2025 ratings, 77% of VA hospitals that received an Overall Hospital Quality Star Rating received 4 or 5 stars, and no VA hospitals received a one-star rating. More than 90% of VA hospitals with ratings maintained or improved their 2024-star rating.

Overall VA improvements during the second Trump Administration

- The backlog of Veterans waiting for VA benefits is down more than 37% since Jan. 20, 2025.
- VA has opened 16 new health care clinics, expanding access for Veterans around the country.
- VA is spending <u>an additional \$800 million</u> on infrastructure improvements to ensure department facilities provide safe and effective patient care.
- Since Jan. 20, VA has offered nearly 1 million health care appointments outside of normal operating hours. These early-morning, evening, and weekend appointments are giving Veterans more timely and convenient options for care.
