Currently, there are six active campaigns:

- H.R. 1004 & S. 410 Love Lives On Act of 2025.
 - Senators Cortez-Masto, & Rosen, along with Representatives Horsford, Lee, & Titus are co-sponsors.
- H.R. 1423 & S. 649 GI Bill Parity Act of 2025.
 - No Nevada Legislator has co-sponsored.
- H.R. 2102 & S. 1032 Major Richard Star Act of 2025.
 - Senators Cortez-Masto, & Rosen, along with Representatives Horsford, Lee, & Titus are co-sponsors.
- H.R. 2605 & S. 1441 The Service Dogs Assisting Veterans (SAVES)
 - Senator Rosen is a co-sponsor.
- H.R. 1815: VA Home Loan Program Reform Act
 - Passed House & Senate.
 - Not yet signed into law by the President.
- H.R. 3151 & S. 1536 SHIPS for America Act of 2025.
 - Representative Amodei is a co-sponsor.

Please go to the Grassroots Action center to generate an email to your legislators and encourage them to co-sponsor these bills.

At the state level, we were following:

- A.B. 145 This bill revises provisions relating to veterans. (BDR 37-77)
 - Senators Michelee Cruz-Crawford, & Roberta Lange, along with Assemblymembers Ken Gray, & Reuben D'Silva were sponsors.

A.B. 145 did not received a vote. The bi-annual legislative session ended on June 2, 2025.





In Washington, The Department of Veterans Affairs today announced it's on pace to reduce total VA staff by nearly 30,000 employees by the end of fiscal year 2025.

Congress will be in recess during the month of August. Please follow up with you representative to attend any town halls.

Please ensure that your members are aware of this information.

Email scams are on the rise, and scammers are becoming more sophisticated in their attempts to trick people into revealing personal information, sending money, or clicking harmful links. We want to make sure everyone stays vigilant and knows how to spot the signs of a scam.



How Email Scams Typically Work:

Scammers often pose as someone you trust—a coworker, supervisor, vendor, or friend. These emails may:

- Ask you to purchase gift cards or send money urgently
- Request sensitive information like passwords or account numbers
- Include links to fake login pages that look real
- Have a generic or unusual tone that seems "off"
- They often create a false sense of urgency, such as "Are you available? I need your help ASAP."



Red Flags to Watch For:

- The sender's email address doesn't match their name or organization
- Poor grammar or awkward phrasing
- Unexpected attachments or links
- · Vague or urgent messages with little detail
- · Requests to keep the conversation secret



How to Protect Yourself:

- Never click links or download attachments from unknown or suspicious sources.
- **Double-check the sender's email address**—don't rely on the display name.
- When in doubt, verify the request through another communication method (phone, text, in person).
- **Report suspicious emails** to [your IT department/security contact/email provider].
- Enable multi-factor authentication (MFA) on your accounts.

Remember: it's always better to double-check than to fall for a scam.

If you ever receive a questionable email, please don't hesitate to reach out or notify your email server (AOL, Google, Yahoo) for review.

The Pipeline Comprehensive Course (PCC) Pre-Apprenticeship Program consists of a 30-hours a week six-week program with small group classes. Students receive individual coaching, mentoring, certifications in OSHA, CPR, and Forklift Operator Awareness.

The Trades Apprenticeship Programs are a proven "earn while you learn" training model that offers workers a pathway to middle class and helps companies recruit, develop, and retain a highly skilled workforce. The Pipeline Comprehensive Course (PCC) Pre-Apprenticeship Program intention is to help individuals prepare for and succeed in the Trades Apprenticeship Programs.

Pre-Apprenticeship Program Eligibility Requirements:

High School Diploma or Equivalent
Nevada Driver's License
Birth Certificate and proof of United States work eligibility
Demonstrate basic math and reading skills on the NVWIT Aptitude test
Random drug test provided by NVWIT

Application Process: \$50 application fee, Scholarships are available on a case-by-case basis. Accepting applications: July 30-31, August 4th-7th, and 11th-13th.

Location: Historic Westside School 330 W Washington all times 3:30pm-5:30pm (be there no later than 4pm to fill out the application)

Classes start on October 20, 2025, part of a mandatory six-week program. Monday - Friday from 9AM to 1PM with four (4) Saturday classes scheduled from 9AM to 230PM
