An Eagle Scout of the Year nominee must be a registered, active member of a Scout Unit chartered by an American Legion Post *OR* must be BSA registered, an active Scout, <u>and</u> must be the son/daughter or grandson/granddaughter of a Legionnaire. In addition to this requirement, the nominee must do the following:

Received the Eagle Scout Rank.

Be an active member of a religious institution and must earn the Scout BSA religious emblem.

Have demonstrated practical citizenship in church, school, Scouting, and the community.

Have reached their 15th birthday and be enrolled in high school at the time of selection

Reside within the Department.

Eagle Scouts still in high school that have reached their 18th birthday during the nomination year, will remain eligible if otherwise qualified.


The nomination for qualified Scouts for this prestigious scholarship must be received by the Department Headquarters no later than March 1, 2021. The American Legion Eagle Scout of the Year will receive a \$10,000 scholarship and the three runner-up scholarship winners will receive a \$2,500 award each.

Americanism Month (February)





Since 1960 when Resolution No. 163 was passed, the month of February is when the American Legion recognizes Americanism. The resolution was passed during the National Convention in Miami Beach, Florida.

"We established observance of an Americanism Month that calls upon each of us to pause and reflect on what it means to be an American, and to rededicate ourselves to taking action that will uphold a 100 percent Americanism," said Richard Anderson, chairman of The American Legion's Americanism Commission. "In 1981, then-National Commander Michael Kogutek said, 'There is no organization whose name is more closely linked in the minds of citizens with genuine Americanism than is The American Legion."

The Preamble to The American Legion Constitution states, "To foster and perpetuate a 100 percent Americanism." Therefore, every Legion Family is encouraged "to reflect on what it means to be an American and our responsibility for fostering Americanism. Americanism should cultivate youth development, educational development, citizenship, community service, religious emphasis, and pride in our nation and the great symbol of our nation, Old Glory."

Americanism is the third pillar and a few of the many American Legion programs that fall under this pillar. Some of these programs include Legion Baseball, Oratorical Contest, Boys State and Nation, Junior Shooting Sports, Scouting and flag education.

According to Richard Anderson he stated that "Through our community involvement we can foster a culture of growth for serving our nation's veterans and their families, for nurturing children and youth everywhere, for our organization and its programs, and for Americanism.

In this time of uncertainty we need to remember to be there for each other, one way is our "Buddy Checks" the other is to pass on what we read in the Department Newsletter. So much information comes from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and the Department Adjutant forwards these updates to Commanders, however with so many of you unable to attend a meeting, I do what I can to choose an article that narrows down important issues concerning all or at least most of you.

In a news release from acting Secretary Tran, dated January 29, 2021 the VA stated that President Biden signed an Executive Order to deliver economic relief to Americans amid the COVID-19 crisis by addressing economic hardships the Veteran community faces during the ongoing pandemic.

Effective January 29, 2021 the VA will extend the existing moratorium on evictions and foreclosures until March 31, 2021 go to (www.benefits.va,gov/HOMELOANS/ resourses_circulars.asp). VA borrowers experiencing financial hardships due to COVID-19 can review VA guidance at (www.benefits.va.gov/homeowners/cares-act-frequently-asked-questions.asp).

The VA is also looking for immediate ways to help over 2 million Veterans, maintain their financial footing by exploring options to ease the burden of federal collections on compensation and pension overpayments and medical and education related debts.

The VA will provide further information and guidance at (www.va.gov). Acting Secretary Tran also said, "The VA is focused on lessoning the financial hardships for Americas Veterans and will continue to work with our partners in Congress and Veterans Service Organizations to honor our Veterans and their families by providing the care and benefits they deserve".





WHAT'S IN IT FOR YOU

Most every month I try to write something for this newsletter. Sometimes its on stuff that has happened at department during the month, or about a little history of the Department or The American Legion. And just as an observation, you will note that I capitalized the "T" in "The" American Legion above. The reason is because it is the title of the Legion and copyrighted. Plus, that is what the Legion tells us to do. So, this month I am not going to write about history but sources of history and knowledge, and there are a bunch of them. So, let's start at district.

District 2 has a website (http://americanlegiondistrict2.org/) that was generated by the District Adjutant, Doc Moss. This site has a location where you can find training and Businesses Resources. It is a great start if you need info about our Department programs and stuff on business information within Nevada. There is also a series of training power point presentation designed and made available by the Department of Wisconsin. Want info rules for wear a legion cap, there is a Power Point presentation that tells you. So, you have a question or want to make a point or understand what you can or can't do, go there.

At National on their website, Legion.org, there is more information available there than you will ever be able to read. As an example, there is a location called Digital Archive that list resolutions pasted by National since its inception. And if you can't find what you are looking the Director of the library has the capability of providing what you are asking for; however, he should be your last resort. Have your department Historian get involve if you need assistance.

There is also a new organization that replaced NALPA (National American Legion Press Association) titled The American Legion Media Alliance (TALMA). They are generating training programs for Posts and Departments to help you provide better services to our Veterans and communities. They also generate the Dispatch which is a monthly newsletter and a wealth of information. You can go into their web area and download past article through various search options. Their most recent newsletter discusses National's move to a single sign-on process for all their websites (except Emblem Sales). What this means is one username and password all websites. There will also be a new rollout for MyLegion which I am sure will be announce and covered to facilitate all of us.

As a last area for this article, I would like to cover "Training Tuesday". Every month on the last Tuesday of the month the National staff will be presenting over the internet a 60 to 90 training program for Commanders and Adjutants. Of more importance, these sessions are recorded and made available for you to view at a later date. This program was initiated in October 2020. Check the videos available as there have been some significant presentations as to where the Legion is going with their enhancements to how we do business.

I know I have only touched the surface of what is available to you within the Legion. The key point that I would like to leave with you is information is available. Nobody will spoon feed it to you as you have to go get it. So, if you are sitting on your computer and tired of playing games or doing work, try going into Legion.org and see what is available to make your post a little better. Remember, Knowledge is power and the key to success. Being the best is what's

Record year for American Legion vehicle donation program

American Legion members helped establish a record year for the organization's vehicle donation program in 2020.

That year 275 vehicles were donated through Charitable Auto Rides Service Inc. (CARS), generating about \$141,500. Proceeds from each auction sale through CARS go to American Legion charities and programs.

In the first full year of using CARS, the Legion experienced rapid growth in the number of donated vehicles. For example, in December 2019, just eight vehicles were donated compared with 98 last month.

"First and foremost, CARS is an extremely proud ally of The American Legion," said Jim Strassburg, director of national business development at CARS. "We hold the mission of supporting our brave veterans, and advocating for patriotism, in very high regard. Our first year can only be seen as a very successful relationship."

Strassburg predicts that revenue generated from donated cars, trucks, boats, and RVs will continue to trend upward.

"We anticipate a tremendous year (2021) for The American Legion," he said. "We estimate volume and corresponding revenue to grow by up to 60 percent. With the vehicle donation market still strong, and additional promotions and marketing being implemented monthly, we anticipate this CARS program to be a significant revenue stream for The American Legion for years to come."

Greetings fellow Legionnaires,

An email was sent out about National Commander Oxford's "Call to Action". His goals were to recruit 100,00 new members, attain 90% renewal rate, and achieve 100 CPR reporting. Between now and March 15th, we need to encourage our Posts and Districts to work the expired rosters, contact and renew members for 2021, and conduct periodic checks to see how members are doing.

On the National level, we have dropped to number 48. We did not meet our target goal of 85% by February 10^{th} . We achieved 78.851% membership. In the Western Region we are third from the bottom. We are behind 188 members of where we were last year. Department has transferred 169 Post 100 members into local Posts. There are 1,359 members who have not renewed their 2021 memberships.

Despite these statistics, our Posts and Districts are progressing.

District 1 is at 65.05%. None of the Posts achieved 85% membership.

District 2 is at 72.26% membership. Four Posts achieved 85% membership or higher.

District 3 is at 90.63% membership. Three Posts achieved 85% membership or higher.

District 4 is at 89.71% membership. Three Posts achieved 85% membership or higher. Kudos to Post 4 for achieving 103.79% membership! They also transferred 40 Post 100 members to their Post! Way to work the Post 100 list.

District 5 is at 56.80% membership. One Post achieved over 85% membership.

There are 853 members in Post 100. Let's find them a Post home. Let's send out recruiting letters and follow up with phone calls. Sometimes a phone call will clinch the deal.

There are letters on mylegion for expired members. We need to follow up with phone calls. Members don't renew their dues for a reason. Perhaps a situation with a Post officer or Post member or a Post situation. Be prepared for negative feedback and yelling. Remain calm and reassure them that things in the Post are different now, etc.

Please continue to send your monthly progress reports to your District Commander or 1st Vice Commander so they can update the Department Membership Team.

It takes teamwork to help our Posts/Districts/Department succeed.



All male descendants, adopted sons and stepsons of members of The American Legion, and such male descendants of veterans who died in service during World War I or since December 7, 1941, during the delimiting periods set forth in Article IV, Section 1, of the National Constitution of The American Legion or who died subsequent to their honorable discharge from such service, shall be eligible for membership in the Sons of The American Legion. There shall be no form or class of membership except an active membership.

American Legion Boys State

American Legion Boys State was founded in 1935 by two Illinois Legionnaires, Hayes Kennedy and Harold Card, who organized the first Boys State at the Illinois State Fairgrounds in Springfield. It is one of the most respected educational programs of government instruction for United States high school students. In this program students become part of the operation of local, county and state government. Boys State programs vary in content and method of procedure from Department to Department, but each adheres to the same basic concept; teaching government from the township to the state level.

The Sons of The American Legion have always played an important role in this program. In addition to Detachments sponsoring delegates, Sons members are encouraged to assist in whatever capacity they are able to such as volunteering as councilors.

I ask all Sons members to recruit potential participants for the American Legion Boy State program and encourage our own eligible members to submit applications.
