Each organization will distribute the cards to veterans who could use a helping hand during these unprecedented times, due to the pandemic.



We made it through the month of April and I am confident that we will make it through the month of May as well. When we are allowed to open our State again, please be cautious and follow the established health protocols to minimize any further exposure to the COVID-19 virus when you do open your Post home and start gathering again.

I am still asking that every Post conduct their **Buddy Checks** to ensure that your membership, your next door neighbors, and your community are doing okay. It is always nice to hear a friendly voice and know that you care on how they are doing. Ask if there is anything you can do for them. There are several programs out there to assist people during these trying times.

By now you may have heard, we have officially canceled this year's Department Convention in Fallon. I do want to thank Fred W. Anderson Post 16 and PDC Ken Clausen for all of their hard work to try and provide us with a successful convention. I am so sorry that we had to cancel, but we had to take in consideration everyone's health and safety. It was not an easy decision to make. Along with canceling the Department Convention, we had to cancel our summer programs as well. So, the Nevada Boys State program and the Nevada Legion Baseball season are officially canceled. This action is in concert with the National Headquarters cancellation of this year's Boys Nation session and Legion Baseball World Series.

Even though we have to comply with the "Stay at Home" order by the Governor, we still are required to get our Consolidated Post Reports (CPR) and the Consolidated Squadron Reports (CSR) turned in. These reports can easily be done online now. We are needing this information to let the National Headquarters and the U.S. Congress know what we are doing as Legionnaires. Please get your report in as soon as possible, it really means a lot and makes a difference.

We will be starting the 2020/2021 300 Club raffle again this August. This is a fundraiser for the Department to assist with the Department budget. With a drop in members within our Department, this means there will be a drop in membership dues income and we need to make sure we have sufficient funds to operate our American Legion programs within our Department. For each raffle purchase, there are forty eight (48) opportunities for you to win. We draw four (4) tickets each month on the 15th from August to July for a *First Prize of \$250.00*, *Second* Prize of \$125.00, Third Prize of \$75.00, and a Fourth Prize of \$50.00. After the monthly drawings, those tickets are then place back in the drum for the next monthly drawing. The nice thing is that you do not have to be present to win and the check will be mailed to you. Each raffle ticket can be purchased starting in June 2020 for \$50 with no limit on the number of tickets you can purchase, except that there are only 300 total tickets available for purchase, hence the name of the raffle, "300 Club". You must be at least 18 years old and a resident of Nevada to purchase a raffle ticket. Something to remember is that a Post can also purchase tickets and use any winnings for their programs. I am asking that each Post purchase at least two percent (2%) of their Post membership in tickets. So, if you have, let's say, 325 Post members...I am asking that the Post and/or its members purchase at least six (6) raffle tickets. which is 2% of 325, rounded down. However, any Post that is less than 100 members, I am asking that you purchase at least one (1) raffle ticket. I am also planning to challenge each District Commander for the highest percentage of Post involvement within their District. Remember, you will be helping out our Department with funding our programs and operations. Thank you. Please, everyone be safe and stay healthy. Let's also **Buddy Check** everyone.


Searchers find wreck of USS Nevada, the WWII battleship that endured bombs, torpedoes and nukes

The sunken hulk of the USS Nevada has been found off the coast of Hawaii, where the battleship — dubbed "unsinkable" for its endurance through World War II — lay since 1948.

Two private firms working together, Search Inc. and Ocean Infinity, discovered the Nevada almost three miles underwater and about 65 nautical miles southwest of Honolulu, the firms said in a statement Monday. Search Inc., a cultural resource management firm, specializes in archaeology; Ocean Infinity surveys the seabed with marine robotics, according to their websites.

The Nevada's lifespan was exceptional, given the troubled waters in which it sailed. It stayed afloat through two world wars and two nuclear-bomb tests.



"Nevada is an iconic ship that speaks to American resilience and stubbornness," James Delgado, the lead maritime archaeologist on the mission, said in the statement. "Rising from its watery grave after being sunk at Pearl Harbor, it survived torpedoes, bombs, shells and two atomic blasts. The physical reality of the ship, resting in the darkness of the great museum of the sea, reminds us not only of past events, but of those who took up the challenge of defending the United States in two global wars."

Photos and video of the excursion show portions of the ship, such as an anti-aircraft gun and hatch for a 5-inch gun room, still intact. Portions of the hull number are visible, as are inscriptions in the steel, all preserved because of the lack of light and oxygen at the extreme depth.

The Nevada was commissioned in 1916 and headed to Great Britain during World War I, according to an account posted online by the Naval History and Heritage Command.

It spent the interwar years cruising everywhere from the Caribbean to Australia. In the late 1920s, the ship was modernized, including installation of new anti-aircraft guns and other beefed-up firepower.

After operating in the Pacific for most of the 1930s, the Nevada was moored at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, when the Japanese Imperial Navy launched a surprise attack on the Pacific Fleet on Oahu on the morning of Dec. 7, 1941.

The attacking aircraft concentrated on Battleship Row in Pearl Harbor, sinking or crippling most of the ships, which had been moored closely together.

The American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary have regarded the red poppy as the official flower of remembrance for the nation's war dead for 100 years.

Inspired by the 1915 poem "In Flanders Fields" by Canadian Lt. Col. John McCrae, The American Legion designated the symbolic flower by a resolution passed at its second national convention in 1920. The American Legion Auxiliary followed with a similar resolution at its first national convention in 1921.

The movement – popularized by New York professor Moina Michael immediately after the armistice that ended World War I in 1918 – would provide tens of millions of dollars to help disabled veterans, military personnel and their families over the next century.

National Poppy Day is May 22 this year, and an American Legion-American Legion Auxiliary web platform is available again – mindful of limitations that may be caused by the coronavirus pandemic – at www.legion.org/poppyday. The platform offers easy access to the American Legion Emblem Sales Poppy Store online and an invitation to participate in a national Instagram campaign to collect images of poppies to share with a national audience.

The site also offers guidance about how to participate in the May tradition of poppy distribution, opportunities to raise funds to help disabled veterans and learn history of the phenomenon and videos of American Legion Past National Commanders John P. "Jake" Comer and Denise M. Rohan reciting the inspirational poems, "In Flanders Fields" by McCrae and "We Shall Keep the Faith" by Michael.

The materials are meant to be shared, in the spirit of the original American Legion resolution, which was called "a symbol to perpetually remind us, and to unfailingly teach coming generations the value of the 'Light of Liberty' and our debt to those who helped to save it for us by paying the supreme sacrifice, and that we may not forget that:

In Flanders Fields, the poppies grow

Among the crosses – row on row."

Hello Legionnaires,

I received the VAVS Annual Joint Review dated 04/27/20 from the Reno VA Sierra Nevada Health Care System (VASNHCS) on the effectiveness of The American Legion, Legionnaire participation in the Voluntary Service Program. (N. Las Vegas VA Medical Center review will not be available until the September/October timeframe).

I know during these trying times it's difficult to volunteer. The timeframe for this review was 04/01/19-03/31/20. I would like to make you aware of just a few of the areas mentioned. We had 12 volunteers during this period down from 17, which meant the volunteer hours were down almost 300 hrs., no youth volunteers, occasional volunteer hours were 39 down from 48, making the number of total volunteer hours 1,168.5 down 299.5 hours, there were no monetary donations, however non-monetary donations were up by \$2,581.00 since the last review.

As you all know volunteering is so important to our local VA Medical Centers and the veterans they serve. Becoming escorts for patients, transportation or running errands as needed. But most of all interaction with the veterans waiting to be seen. I know from experience, a friendly hello sometimes means more than you may realize. As we all know The American Legion is a service organization of veterans helping veterans and their families. Many of the veterans seen at our local VA's have no family to speak of so we may be the only ones to listen to the conversations they might want to have.

I do hope we can put in a little extra effort to be there for our comrades and VA Medical Centers as volunteers. You can contact your local VA for more information on volunteering.

Mentioned in the review, that The American Legion continues to Provide World Class Care and Service to America's Heroes at the VASNHCS through Regular Service Volunteers, occasional hours and donations supporting their holiday programs.

The VA has asked us to meet some new goals for the timeframe of 04/01/20-03/31/21.

These new goals are:

THERE WAS A "MERCI TRAIN"

With our lives entangled with COVID-19 and its repercussions on the activities within the American Legion I thought it might be interesting to transgress into the past and look at an event that is probably today unknown except for a small few. This event is a highlight of what Americans can do; and, I am assuming many of these Americans were WW! and WW2 Vets.

So, the event was started by newspaper columnist Drew Pearson. Back in 1947 Pearson was disturbed by the conditions in France and Italy that he asked the American people to donate food, medical supplies, clothing and other personal items be collected and sent overseas to the devastated areas. His plan was to have a train cross America and pick up the donations at stops along the way. This train, called the "Friendship Train" left Los Angeles on 7 November 1947 and arrived in New York on 14 November. It started out with eight empty boxcars and arrived in New York with 700 boxcars loaded donated goods with a worth of \$40 million. These supplies were shipped to Europe for distribution in the devastated region.



Now, the flip side to the American's generosity was the response by the French. A French WW! veteran and railroad worker by the name of Andre Picard was so moved by the American's generosity, that he decided to reciprocate. He partnered with the French Veterans Association and they responded by sending to America boxcars loaded with mementos from French citizens. The train was called the "Merci Train", or the "Thankyou Train". This train arrived in the United States on 3 February 1949 with a total of 49 boxcars. The train in the US became known as the "Gratitude Train". This train crossed the nation and dropped off a boxcar in each state fully loaded with the gifts from France.

As a little more history, the boxcars sent were used during the wars to move troop across the warzone. They held 40 people and had no accommodations. The individuals had hardly enough room to sit and to sleep that arranged themselves in rows. The boxcars that arrived at each state was in itself an antique as all were build during the period from 1885 to 1901. Not sure how it happens but the Veterans of the era decided to make these boxcars a memorial

in respect for those that road in them. The assumption made is the Legion was very involved with this effort at the local level.

Today, the Nevada boxcar sits in Carson City at the Nevada State Museum and was renovated back in 1995. The 40 and 8 Society, along with its affiliate, the National Boxcar Association, took the task to restore the boxcar and are instrumental in continuing its upkeep. There is also a movement on-going to possibly move the boxcar to the Nevada Railroad Museum located in Boulder City.to give it the recognition it deserves. There will be more on this when the state opens up from the virus.







The Nevada took one torpedo and several bomb hits during the first of two attack waves. Moored at the end of Battleship Row, the Nevada took advantage of the lull after the first wave to get underway. But it had not made it to sea before the second wave of aircraft descended on the harbor, striking the ship with a half-dozen bombs.

The crew was forced to beach the sinking ship at the head of the channel.

After frenzied temporary repairs, the Nevada sailed on its own power to the U.S. West Coast in April 1942, where it spent the next year being repaired and overhauled.

It returned to combat during the Battle of Attu in the Aleutian Island in May 1943 and was then transferred to the Atlantic for the D-Day invasion in June 1944. It sailed back to the Pacific and became part of the Iwo Jima and Okinawa invasions in 1945. In the latter battle, the ship was hit by a kamikaze plane and an artillery shell.

It was preparing to be part of the invasion force on the Japanese mainland when the war ended in September 1945.

With the end of World War II, the Navy deemed the three-decade old battleship too ancient for the fleet.

Its final job was to serve as a target during two atomic bomb tests at Bikini in the Marshall Islands in 1946 – though even that dirty work left the ship only badly damaged and radioactive, not sunk.

The ship was decommissioned in August 1946, and two years later it was towed to sea off the Hawaiian islands and used for target practice for other Navy ships. Even that four-day pummeling didn't sink the battle-scarred ship. It was finally scuttled by an aerial torpedo.

Although the Navy was aware of the vicinity of the ship's sinking, its exact resting spot was unknown until now.

The search for the USS Nevada was conducted aboard Ocean Infinity's Pacific Constructor vessel, which had set sail for a range of tasks in early 2020, well before the coronavirus had morphed into a pandemic.

"As a result of the global health crisis, the ship has remained at sea on a range of taskings," Ocean Infinity said in the statement.
