Please accept my very deep appreciation to you and your entire team for stepping up and proving how to <u>Be Part Of The Solution</u> when needed most. I remain very proud of our organization and the friendship and association with great Americans such as your team in Nevada.

Fred and his team are to be commended on their support and show of compassion to the family and friends and ensuring another hero was properly transferred to Post Everlasting in a manner deserving of a Veteran who honorably served their country.



POW/MIA Recognition Day, Friday, September 18<sup>th</sup>, is for us to remember those who were held as Prisoners of War and those who are Missing in Action and never came back from war. All of these days require our attention and recognition.



### The Month of September is significant

On September 27, 1920, the poppy became the official flower of The American Legion family to memorialize

the soldiers who fought and died during the war. The distribution of poppies became a national program in 1924



The American Legion Family distributes poppies asking that those receiving the flower make a donation to support the future of veterans, active-duty military personnel and their families. Poppy Day is celebrated in countries around the world. The Friday before Memorial Day is designated as National Poppy Day. On May 22, wear a red poppy to honor the fallen and support the living who have worn our nation's uniform.

September is also National Suicide Prevention Month. Suicide is the tenth leading cause of death in America. In order to create awareness and strengthen the fight against suicide, the entire month of September is Suicide Prevention Month. Participate in the fight by getting involved with local organizations and listening to those who need help. The military suicide rate continues to be a major problem for the Department of Defense.

The third Friday of September is POW/MIA recognition day. This should be a day when Americans and businesses should fly their POW/MIA flags to commemorate US service members who are recognized prisoners of war (POWs) or missing in action (MIA). More than 82,000 Americans remain missing from World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, the Cold War, the Gulf War and other conflicts.

The following is a suggested POW/MIA Remembrance Service, which can be modified:

Those who have served, and those currently serving in the uniformed services of the United States, are ever mindful that the sweetness of enduring peace has always been tainted by the bitterness of personal sacrifice. We are compelled to never forget that while we enjoy our daily pleasures, there are others who have endured and may still be enduring the agonies of pain, deprivation and imprisonment.

Before we begin our activities, we pause to recognize our POWs and MIAs.

We call your attention to this small table which occupies a place of dignity and honor. It is set for one, symbolizing the fact that members of our armed forces are missing from our ranks. They are referred to as POWs and MIAs.

We call them comrades. They are unable to be with their loved ones and families, so we join together to pay humble tribute to them, and to bear witness to their continued absence. The table is small, symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner, alone against his or her suppressors. The tablecloth is white, symbolic of the purity of their intentions to respond to their Country's call to arms. The single rose in the vase signifies the blood they may have shed in sacrifice to ensure the freedom of our beloved United States of America. This rose also reminds us of the family and friends of our missing comrades who keep faith, while awaiting their return. The red ribbon on the vase represents an unyielding determination for a proper accounting of our comrades who are not among us. A slice of lemon on the plate reminds us of their bitter fate. The salt sprinkled on the plate reminds us of the countless fallen tears of families as they wait. The glass is inverted, they cannot toast with us at this time. The chair is empty. They are NOT here. The candle is reminiscent of the light of hope, which lives in our hearts to illuminate their way home, away from their captors, to the open arms of a grateful nation. The American flag reminds us that many of them may never return - and have paid the supreme sacrifice to insure our freedom. Let us pray to the Supreme Commander that all of our comrades will soon be back within our ranks.

Let us remember - and never forget their sacrifice.

May God forever watch over them and protect them and their families.

Hello fellow Legionnaires

As our lives continue to be effected by the COVID-19 Pandemic, I'm reminded about those of you in need of financial aid.

The September 2020 Newsletter on Veterans Benefits put out by the VA, has a lot of information that can be helpful pertaining to those needing VA Aid and Attendance or Housebound benefits, and how it provides monthly payments that are added to the amount of a monthly VA pension for qualified Veterans and Survivors.

If you need help with daily activities, or your housebound, and to find out if you qualify, you must meet one of the the requirements I'm going to list.

#### VA Aid and Attendance eligibility

- 1. You have to stay in bed-or spend a large portion of the day in bed because of illness, **or**
- 2. You are a patient in a nursing home due to the loss of mental or physical abilities related to a disability, **or**
- 3. Your eyesight is limited (even with glasses or contact lenses have only 5/200 or less in both eyes; or concentric

contraction of the visual field of 5 degrees or less).

### Housebound benefits eligibility

If you get a VA pension and you spend most of your time in your home because of a permanent disability (a disability that doesn't go away), you may be eligible for this benefit.

note: You can't get Aid and Attendance and Housebound benefits at the same time.

To get the benefit for Aid and Attendance you will need to download VA Form 21-2680 (PDF) and send it to your Pension Management Center (PMC). You will need to provide a doctors report, details about what you do and how you get to places normally during the day and details to show what kind of illness, injury or disability that effects you, like taking a bath on your own.


if your in a nursing home, you'll also need to fill out a Request for Nursing Home Information in Connection with Claim Aid and Attendance, you'll need to download VA Form 21-0779 (PDF).

You can also take your information to a VA Regional Office near you. I do hope this information is helpful to you.

### DID YOU KNOW?




Over the years I have often wondered what the National Youth Cadet Law Enforcement Program was all about. You hear about it periodically; however, it really is never front page news in any of the Legion's periodicals or brochures. So, with nothing else to write about I thought it might be a topic to discuss in our monthly newsletter. The American Legion National Youth Cadet Law Enforcement Program was established and adopted in 1985 at National Convention in New Orleans. The purpose of the program was "to stimulate respect for law enforcement and patriotic and responsible citizenship". Initially under the Americanism Commission it was transferred to the National Security Commission; however, in 2011 it was returned to the Americanism Commission. The rationale was that it fit better with the Americanism Commission's other programs such as Boys State. And Boys State is very similar to the Law enforcement Program.

Basically, the Law Enforcement Program is a summer program where individuals (male and female) attend a camp of a week or so in length and participate in a course of instruction on what law enforcement is all about. The course varies from state to state but include such training topics as first-aid, air rescue, Police k-9, Defense tactics, SWAT, Collision investigation, and the list goes on. Attendees also participate in daily physical training. The class-room instruction and physical training is under the supervision of law enforcement personal ranging from city up through state/federal law enforcement agencies. The American Legion Departments partner with these agencies ensuring that participants are provided lodging, daily meals, uniforms, and class material. American Legion Posts recommend who should attend and, as a general rule, foot the cost for their recommended attendee. The camp in most cases is conducted at law enforcement training centers; however, this is not a requirement. For example, the Arizona program which was started in 1981 conducts their annual event at the Emmanuel Pines Camp in Prescott, AZ

Attendees to this program need not be a member of the Legion to attend. However, all must be physically fit, have excellent moral character, and have an interest in law enforcement. The Legion Department sponsoring a program establish selection criteria.

Today there are 21 States with a program. The two states closest to Nevada with a program are Oregon and Arizona. At the National level, there is a committee of eight who oversee the program. The chart below depicts the states who presently have a program.

# American Legion Riders



Greetings Comrades,

With the coronavirus forcing social distancing and stay-at-home orders, all American Legion national events have been canceled throughout the summer. This includes what was going to be the 15th annual American Legion Legacy Run – the primary fundraiser for The American Legion Legacy Scholarship Fund. Through the efforts of the American Legion Family, spearheaded by the Legion Riders – five of the previous six Legacy Runs have raised more than \$1 million for a fund that since 2004 has awarded \$3.6 million in aid to 401 military children of the fallen and disabled.

#### By the numbers: The American Legion Legacy Scholarship

In order to continue raising money for the Legacy Scholarship Fund during these times, The American Legion has created a tiered donation program to provide an alternative way for individual American Legion Family members to contribute to the fund. Donations start at \$15, signifying the 15th year of the Legacy Run, and will entitle the donor to various souvenirs from this year's altered Legacy Run, as has been the case for participants in and donors to previous rides. The tiered individual donation program is:

Tier 1 - \$15: Donors receive a thank-you card signed by the national commander and American Legion Riders chairman.

Tier 2 - \$25: Donors receive a 15th Annual challenge coin. Tier 3 - \$50: Donors receive a 15th Annual Ride t-shirt.

**Tier 4 - \$75:** Donors receive a Legacy Run 15 years in review booklet, the ride's main patch and a "Quarantined 2020 Riding in Spirit" rocker. **Tier 5 - \$250:** Donors receive all the above items.



Additionally, The American Legion maintains a reward program that recognizes \$500 and above donations made by individuals, posts or departments. These donations are either sent in to national, presented at the national convention or donated at stop points on the Legacy Run. The reward structure for those donations are:

• The first \$500 donor receives a plaque with a Legacy Run coin affixed within. The plaque has five coin slots for consecutive years. Each year after every \$500 or more donated, another coin is awarded (minimum donation amount received for all 5 years is \$2,500). When the plaque is filled with five coins, another plaque is awarded and the reward program starts over.





- Outside edges have 4 rows of lock stitching to resist tearing.






