Let's Celebrate: March 15th is the Legion's 101st Birthday






March 15th is the designated birthday of The American Legion and will mark the beginning another year. This is the day in 1919 when the first American Legion caucus, held by members of the American Expeditionary Force, convened in Paris. March 15th is the date on which the Legion came to life.

Throughout the organization's history, local posts across the country have celebrated with festivities that have included the entire community. For the 20th birthday in 1939, Battle Mountain Post 71 in Hot Springs, S.D., brought out a 40-pound birthday cake - two pounds for every year of The American Legion's history. For the 38th birthday in 1957, Post 214 in Upper Darby, Pa., hosted an entire week's worth of events as part of American Legion Birthday Week, so proclaimed by the township's Board of Commissioners. Parties, dances and a two-act play were held at Post 214's clubhouse.


The American Legion has released a suggested speech to incorporate into your yearly celebration. Please share this speech with your members.



Secretary: VA taking steps on coronavirus protection March 10, 2020

Department of Veterans Affairs Secretary Robert Wilkie told hundreds of veterans Tuesday in Washington, D.C., that steps are now being taken to protect residents at VA's 134 assisted living centers from exposure to the coronavirus.

"We will be going into an emergency situation where we will limit visitors coming to the nursing facilities so we can protect those who are in those facilities, most of whom are over the age of 80," Secretary Wilkie told attendees of the 60th American Legion Washington Conference. "As with everything else the Armed Forces of the United States does, we will get over this, and we will make sure everything is done to protect those who have done so much for our country."

Secretary Wilkie is a member of the president's coronavirus task force, added that other advanced precautions are being taken at all VA health-care facilities. "At all of our VA facilities now, we stop people before they go in. we are akin sure that those who come to us are screened. We ask questions. We take temperatures."

NOVEL CORONAVIRUS PREVENTION TIPS

Don't be scared, be prepared! Help prevent the spread of respiratory diseases like COVID-19.



Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand-sanitizer containing at least 60% alcohol. Thorough cleaning with soap and water will remove most microorganisms.



Avoid touching your mouth, nose, and eyes with unwashed hands.



Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.



Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces including: desks, tables, countertops, sinks, door handles, faucets, railings, phones, bathrooms and rooms.

Cleaning removes germs from surfaces, while disinfecting kills germs on surfaces. Use alcoholbased products to disinfect surfaces.



Stay home when you are sick,
except to get medical care. Call your doctor
before going in to get checked so they are
aware of your condition.
Avoid close contact with people
who are sick. If a family member is sick, place
them in a separate room and bathroom if
possible.



Remember to stay calm and practice good hygiene. Reach out to your local health department or medical provider with any questions.

Hospital Help Plan Overview

THE AMERICAN LEGION LEGISLATIVE AGENDA FOR THE 116TH CONGRESS

Toxic exposures and burn pits

Millions of veterans have been deployed in the Global War on Terror, and a disturbingly high percentage of them have been exposed to airborne toxic hazards during their service as a result of burn pits. The American Legion has for decades fought for service-connected disability benefits for adverse health conditions linked to toxic exposures in service and will continue to do so for this generation. The American Legion supports measures to establish a presumption of exposure as well as continued studies on the effects of burn pits. (S. 2950)

Health care for women veterans

VA must continue to develop and expand healthcare services for the fast-growing population of female veterans, a large percentage of whom do not enroll for VA health care for a number of reasons, according to surveys. Among the factors are limited gender-specific treatment services and awareness of VA benefits. All veterans, regardless of gender, must receive fair and equal VA health-care services. (5. 514, H.R. 3224)

Support VA's suicide-prevention efforts

An estimated 20 veterans die by suicide every day. Most were not receiving care or support through VA that may have saved them. The American Legion supports expanding and promoting mental health treatment for veterans and urges Congress to provide VA necessary funds to hire mental health professionals and proper staffing for its Integrative Health and Wellness Program. (S. 785)

Reaffirm commitment to our allies

In a time of rising great power competition, the United States must maintain a strong alliance system to promote democracy and protect our national interests abroad. Diplomacy is the first line of defense for the United States and must be properly resourced and funded to ensure we put our service members in harm's way only when absolutely necessary. The American Legion supports bills that would provide the State Department necessary resources to maintain and expand our alliance system, ensure aid programs to allies remain properly funded, and promote our national interests abroad. (H.Res 220)

Fully fund a superior national defense

The American Legion supports a defense budget that complies with the Pentagori's 2018 National Defense Strategy in order to reverse the damaging effects of sequestration, provide fair compensation of military personnel and modernize the U.S. military to protect against any aggression, especially in a time of growing great power competition. (Resolution 35, 2018)

Pay the Coast Guard

On a daily basis, U.S. Coast Guard personnel carry out missions that are vital to national security. The Coast Guard, however, is the only military branch forced to work without pay during a government shutdown. This is unacceptable. The repeated and all too common threat of government shutdowns brings severe hardship on our Coast Guard members and their families. No member of the U.S. military service should ever live in fear of not being paid. The American Legion supports bills and provisions that will ensure the Coast Guard is paid during government shutdowns. (S. 21, M.R. 367)

Implement, oversee recent laws

The 115th Congress passed multiple American Legionsupported bills that help veterans and their families, from the backlog-aimed VA Appeals Modernization Act to the omnibus VA MISSION Act. The Legion continues to call on the 116th Congress to ensure these measures are accurately and quickly implemented, as intended.

Protect the GI Bill

With passage of the Forever GI Bill, Congress should now focus on ensuring that student veterans and their families receive the highest quality education when using their GI Bill benefits. The American Legion believes that legislation and federal agency action should be taken to ensure better quality and student outcomes for servicemembers and veterans, by excluding DoD and VA funds from the 90-10 calculation for federal student aid. Also, Congress should create common-sense oversight of schools and give military-connected students the same rights as non-veterans when their schools close, when they face an overpayment, and when a school loses its eligibility to operate. (H.R. 4625, S. 2857)

Help end veteran homelessness

To fully implement VA's pledge to eradicate veteran homelessness, Congress must continue making investments in affordable housing and programs such as Supportive Services for Veteran Families that move veterans and their families off the streets and into stable housing with supportive services. (Resolution 340, 2016)

Support for Gold Star families

The families of our failen service members forever bear the burden of the losing loved ones who gave their last full measure of devotion in defense of our great nation, security and freedom. The American Legion is dedicated to ensuring Gold Star families receive the absolute best care and services from the Department of Defense and the Department of Veterans Affairs. (Resolution 14, 2018)

Veterans share 6 top insights for financial preparedness


1,507 U.S. military veterans recently offered their best advice for active-duty servicemembers and veteran families regarding personal financial decisions. The survey was conducted for the newly released <u>Veterans Financial Preparedness Report 2019</u>, prepared by the Legionnaire Insurance Trust for the departments of The American Legion in celebration of the Legion's 100th anniversary.

A mantra of saving

The overwhelmingly most common advice veterans shared was, "Save, save, save!" The importance of saving to financial health and preparedness can't be underscored enough, but what does this mean in the context of veterans' daily lives? Many veterans gave insights in their top advice.

Start saving from Day One, paying yourself first.

Veterans who start saving early are more likely to be in a strong financial position, according to the *Veterans Financial Preparedness Report 2019*. In fact, the report found that 60% of veterans who say they are ahead in their financial plans for retirement started saving immediately after high school or within the first 2 years of joining the military.



In their advice, these veterans comment that it's not always easy to save, but it is well worth it in the long run:

- "Start when it's still uncomfortable—you won't regret it later."
- "If you wait, chances are you'll wait too long."
- "Even \$10 [could] be worth hundreds by the time you retire because of compounding."
- "You will always feel you are not making enough. Do not let that keep you from saving."
- "Pay yourself first."
- "Focus on saving as much as possible with each check—almost like it's a car payment or a requirement."

Save as much as possible.

The more you can save, especially early on, the better financially prepared you will be. That can mean making sacrifices to ensure you're saving enough.

- "Beginning today, start putting money aside for your retirement years, and have it reviewed at least once per year. As your monthly paycheck goes up, so should your contributions to your own retirement."
- "Save until it hurts. Be soldier-minded in regards to how you save—be minimalists like a soldier. Then afterward, you've achieved a seemingly impossible number."
- "Start your Thrift Saving Plan (TSP) immediately, and put the maximum amount you can in."
- "If you have a 401k, match what the company vests."


Don't spend money on things you don't need.

Veterans emphasize the importance of discipline in spending. Prioritizing your true needs and savings over things you would like to have is a key part of that.

- "Evaluate need versus want when buying expensive items."
- "Save every penny you can. Material things are not important. Expensive cars, clothes and other things are not important. Saving for your future is important!"
- "Don't get into debt. There's a big difference between want and need. The mistakes you make financially will follow you for decades."

Live within your means, avoiding debt.

In addition to having enough money for retirement, veterans' top financial concerns included more immediate financial needs, such as meeting financial obligations each month and paying off debt, according to the Legionnaire Insurance Trust report.



Veterans offered a number of recommendations for tackling these concerns, including:

- "Follow the rule that unless it's an emergency, if you can't pay cash, then you can't buy it."
- "Set a budget and communicate with your spouse. Talk about money—don't ignore it."
- "If you don't have a way to pay for something, don't buy it (discipline)."
- "No matter how much money you make, still make it a point to make that amount stretch as much as you can paycheck to paycheck."

Start planning for retirement early.

Looking ahead and working from a concrete financial plan unique to your circumstances and goals is another key piece of advice from veterans.

- "Don't wait to start planning for the future. The earlier you start saving and thinking ahead, the better prepared you'll be."
- "Write down your financial goals: short-term, medium-term and long-term."
- "Stick to your plans and goals."

Educate yourself.

A key component to successfully planning and saving that many veterans highlighted is making sure to build your knowledge of personal financial issues. The report found a strong tie between financial preparedness and knowledge: 91% of veterans who are ahead of schedule for retirement consider themselves knowledgeable about personal finances, while 75% of veterans who are behind say they are *not* knowledgeable.

- "Use any and every opportunity and resource you can access or utilize."
- "Do your homework, and research every decision you make so you know exactly what you're getting into."
- "Listen to and learn from every military pension presentation. So much value is given that I learned from them and continue to use what I learned."
- "Take advantage of classes that will prepare you financially for your time in the service and for when you are discharged.

 Learn about organizations that can help current and former military persons."

Discover more insights from veterans

Additionally in this article, I'd like to make you all aware of potential opportunities to further serve our veterans and the State of Nevada. As I'm sure you all know, each year the Governor makes hundreds of appointments to various boards, commissions, and committees in our state. I thought I'd take this opportunity to bring your attention to a few vacancies that should be of interest to our members.

The Northern Nevada Veterans' Cemetery Advisory Committee currently has three (3) vacancies, all for members of veterans' organizations recognized nationally or in this State.

The Southern Nevada Veterans' Cemetery Advisory Committee currently has one (1) vacancy for a member of a veterans' organizations recognized nationally or in this State.

The Veterans' Service Commission currently has four (4) vacancies, one (1) for a member who is a representative of veterans' organizations recognized nationally or in this State and who possess honorable discharges from some branch of the military or naval service of the United States, one (1) who is a member of the Women's Veterans Advisory Committee, and two (2) who are representatives of the general public.

The Women Veterans Advisory Committee currently has three (3) vacancies, all for former members of the Armed Forces of the United States, including, without limitation, the Nevada Army National Guard and the Nevada Air National Guard, who received, upon severance from service, an honorable discharge.
